'Let's Play: Doctor' – this fun program will introduce the children to all the ways doctors can help people. They can hear and understand new vocabulary that you can encourage them to take into their imaginative play. Click the picture below.





It is really simple to <u>make</u> <u>nurse and doctor hats</u> using white paper, cello tape and a red marker. Similar to the vet patient check in, you could use a red cross symbol to make a doctor's note pad. Use this as an opportunity for talk! Can your child find their own body parts like their eyes, nose, ears, tummy, legs etc. Enjoy your imaginative play!



This simple craft gets young kids practising the surprisingly difficult task of tracing around their hand. It also lets them explore the idea of having bones and a skeleton beneath their skin.

You will need:



Marker/pencil Paper Cotton buds Glue stick

- Trace around your hand with the marker. You can make more than one if you want!
- 2. Glue on the cotton buds so that they look like bones from an x-ray.







It looks best if you draw a bit of arm onto the page too. :)


