Organisation and Management

The Board of Governors:

The Board of Governors has overall responsibility for the effective management of the school. They are required to meet for a minimum of three times each year.

The Board of Governors is involved in all aspects of school life. The following is a brief summary of the duties of the Governors:

- Governors are responsible for the effective management of the school and use of the funds allocated to it by the Education Authority
- They are also responsible for ensuring that the teachers in the school have the facilities necessary to provide a curriculum which meets the requirements of the Order and for producing a policy in relation to the curriculum
- Governors are required to ensure that appropriate arrangements are
 put in place for the admission of pupils to the school and for drawing
 up criteria which will be used to select pupils should it happen that
 the number of pupils seeking to be enrolled exceeds the number of
 places available
- The complement of staff in the school, both teaching and nonteaching, is controlled by the Governors and arrangements for dealing with issues involving industrial relations within the school also fall within their remit
- Fostering partnership and involvement of parents in the affairs of the school

The Board of Governors met on 4 occasions last year to discuss issues related to school and respond to matters raised by the Principal. They both supported and challenged the Principal in relation to the smooth day to day running of Glendermott.

A wide variety of issues are discussed at these meetings.

The range of expertise amongst the Governors enables them to ensure that pupils are experiencing high quality education within a safeguarded environment and that the school's finances are being well utilised.

The Board of Governors was appointed during the 2024-25 school year.

Premises

Glendermott is located approximately 2 miles from the city of Derry serving the parish of Ardmore. The school is situated in a rural location which benefits from substantial grounds including all weather playgrounds, a courtyard garden, grassed playing area, designated Nursery Outdoor areas and small woodland. The school also benefits from access to the grounds of The Beech Hill Hotel and Ardmore Cricket Field which are adjacent to the school grounds.

In 1912 a school building was built on the site that the school occupies today. The school was named 'Glendermott' because at the time the area was part of the Parish of Glendermott.

In 1974, Ardmore became a parish in its own right taking the school out of the parish it was named after. It was decided that despite this the school name would not be changed. The school currently has 199 pupils from ages 3-11 with a catchment area stretching as far away as Claudy.

An extensive programme of modernisation has been carried out at the school over the years.

An infant block, junior block and an extended assembly hall have been added. The Nursery Unit was opened in 1998 and the school accommodation also comprises a library, ICT room, 2 learning support rooms and a designated play area for the Foundation Stage. In September 2016 the school successfully secured a full cooking kitchen when work was carried out to refurbish the previous servery kitchen. The school now operates a thriving school kitchen which provides breakfast, snack and dinner options for the children, all freshly cooked on site.

Our school benefits from close links with the parish as we have the unique position of being the only school located within the parish boundaries. Rev Dr J McGrory is a frequent visitor to the school and alongside the Board of Governors is very supportive of the school and its work.

Child Protection Teachers 2024-25

They were available in connection with concerns regarding the welfare and 'protection' of pupils at our school. All teachers and staff are aware of child protection issues and were given Child Protection training in August 2023.

- Staff will respond using well-defined school procedures to 'concerns' raised by a child or adult when reported to them
- A new Child Protection Policy is available to all parents and was ratified by the Board of Governors on 15th October 2024.

School Meals

Mrs Gormley and her team proved an excellent service to our school and are continually searching for ways to improve their provision. They continue to work closely with the EA to increase the nutritional value of our meals, which continue to be amongst the best provided in all local schools. When inspected by Derry City and Strabane District Council in conjunction with the Foods Standards Agency the kitchen was awarded a rating of 5 – the highest available.

The Governors wish to place on record their appreciation for all of the work carried out in the school kitchen and for the co-operation shown by Mrs Gormley and her staff when working with the Principal and the Teachers at all times of the year, where they provided meals and catering services beyond those required of them.

Review of the Year

The Curriculum

The governors are confident that Glendermott Primary School continues to provide a safe, secure and stimulating learning environment and offers a great variety of learning opportunities suitable to the needs of each pupil. Staff expertise and resources are well utilised to assist each child as they strive to reach their maximum potential. Due to reduced government and EA finance, the staff attended fewer courses organised by RTU, CCEA, ETI, the EA and other agencies but they have still been able to keep up to date with the ongoing changes and developments within education via online training.

The staff continues to engage in a range of strategies to support under achievers in both literacy and numeracy. Additional SEN support was again given both individually and in groups alongside Reading Recovery Sessions and Literacy advisory support from a teacher within the EA's Literacy Peripatetic Service.

Achievement

Academic progress has been maintained on every level and our reports reflect a school where the vast majority of children appreciate the importance of striving to always give their best. Our high level of good manners and respect for others has always been maintained and most importantly, both inside and outside the classroom, pupils have further developed the excellent name of Glendermott Primary School.

School Policies

The staff, in consultation with pupils, parents and governors, has produced a wide range of pastoral care and curriculum policies that is suited to the needs of current legislation, good practice and the revised curriculum. This year a number of policies were reviewed and updated.

School Development Plan 24-25

For the 24-25 school year we operated with an interim 1 year school development plan. Senior school staff took this decision based upon the fact that training on the SDP process was scheduled for this year.

This plan is the basis on which development will take place on an annual basis in the following areas - curriculum, pastoral issues, whole school development, community links, school management and building maintenance. Curriculum co-ordinators produced an Action Plan in their area of expertise as part of the School Development Plan for 2022-23 Throughout the year these plans were acted upon and evaluated regularly.

Due to industrial action this year no school development plan was completed. Senior staff in the school decided to follow union action and collectively decided to allow teaching staff this academic year to focus on the teaching and learning in their own classrooms. Peer mentoring and support was offered to teachers and in school training sessions were provided to enable teachers to improve their practice.

With the completion of EA training, a new 3 year School Development Plan will be produced in the Autumn term of 25-26

After School Activities

During the year the teachers and outside agencies provided a programme of extra-curricular activities as a valuable extension to children's learning. These included:

Assessment & Reporting Academic Attainment

Assessment is an integral part of teaching and learning. A key element of assessment is the continuous monitoring of pupil progress. Continuous monitoring, which has always been a feature of the work of teachers, emphasises the formative purpose of assessment. It also supports the summative aspects of assessment providing information about pupils' achievements.

Parents were given an opportunity to discuss with the class teacher their child's progress during arranged interviews in November and at other times during the year by appointment with the class teacher. The revamped annual written report, which covered all the subjects specified in the revised Northern Ireland Curriculum, was sent to parents in June.

Despite industrial action, formal Key Stage Assessment arrangements took place throughout Key Stage 1 (P4) and Key Stage 2 (P7) and children in these year groups were given levels in accordance with the NI Curriculum, and these were reported to their parents, however they were not reported to CCEA or DENI. P7 pupils were issued with Records of Achievement folders before leaving school.

Special Education Needs 2024-25

"All children and young people are entitled to education of the highest quality which enables them to develop as individuals and gain skills, knowledge and understanding." – Together Towards Improvement - DENI

The identified educational needs of each child are catered for by his/her class teacher who is supported by our Special Needs teacher, senior staff including Principal and Board of Governors as well as other relevant outside agencies. Mrs J Kelly is our Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO). We also have a number of SEN Assistants who provide one-on-one support for children who have a Statement of Special Educational Needs at Stage 5 in the 'Code of Practice'.

The Government's Code of Practice on the identification and Assessment of Special Needs (1998 DE) and the Supplement to the Code of Practice (2005 DE) established the way the special education is managed in schools. The Board of Governors and teaching staff have worked to ensure that our school meets the requirements of this legislation and the development of an inclusive school community.

In our school we offer both withdrawal and in class support for children experiencing difficulties with the curriculum. We believe that we offered an extensive range of Special Needs Support in our school during 2023-24, including involving a range of outside agencies. Throughout the year there were 34 children on the SEN register in the Primary School or the Nursery from Stages 1 to 3.

In 2024-25 Special Needs Support was offered to:

- Children from P3 to P7 who are at Stage 2 on the Code of Practice, as well as children at Stage 3
- As well as SENCO help, additional Classroom Assistance support was provided to children with Statements of Educational Needs
- 'Book Buddies' is a very successful early intervention programme and we have trained assistants and Y7 children, who used their knowledge to provide additional reading assistance to children in P3 to P7
- The EA Educational Psychologist received 3 'referrals' for identified children and undertook 'reviews' of 3 children with statements who were transferring to post primary.
- Three requests for statutory assessment were made.

Our SENCO also works alongside the outreach behaviour support from the EA and received advisory support for 2 children.

We work closely with specialised teachers from a range of 'special support agencies'.
